Assignment Two: What in the world is going on?



Being an informed citizen is the first step toward your development as a purposeful and active citizen. This assignment will allow you to explore a current events news topic of your choice and to present it to the class.

1. Read or watch the news (newspaper, Internet, TV, etc.).
2. Select one news story of interest to you. The event may be local (Ottawa), national (Canada) or global. You may want to find an article that relates to the rights and duties of citizens or a group/individual displaying good or bad citizenship.
3. Prepare a written summary of your news story to use during your presentation. Remember, your summary should be much shorter than the actual article/story! Use the organizer on the back of this page to organize your ideas.
4. Prepare a 2-3 minute presentation to the class. You may wish to show the link to your story or a relevant photo or news video/YouTube clip.
5. Prepare two discussion questions about the news story to ask the class and lead a brief class discussion about the event.
